Keep in mind that becoming honest in recovery is <u>not</u> about indiscriminately doing a fifth step with everyone you know. You are still in charge of making decisions about self-disclosure with others. You get to decide what to reveal, to whom, and when to reveal it. Working with a 12 step recovery sponsor can assist you making decisions about revealing old dishonest behaviors. Sponsorship can also guide Making Amends in the eighth step.
